Jun - Sept, 2021 Mens Dresswear Drive for Church of Gethsemane

Racial Justice teamed with Plymouth's Underground Thrift Store in a men's clothing drive to support the prison ministry at Church of Gethsemane in Brooklyn. Members and friends of Plymouth donated suits, shirts, sweaters, ties to support job seekers resettling after release from prison.



Jul 11, 2021 Becoming a More Inclusive Church

We invited Brett Younger to lead a discussion on what it would mean for Plymouth to become a more inclusive church. Is friendliness enough to make everyone feel at home? How does inclusivity help the church, and how is it challenging? How can we, as church and as individuals, work for diverse participation?



Feb - Apr, 2021 Lenten Small Group on Racial Justice: Doing the Right Thing

For 7 weeks, a diverse group of nine discussed what Christians can do - as individuals and as a church - to confront racial injustice. As jumping off points we used readings from Ta-Nehisi Coates' 'We were Eight Years in Power,' James Baldwin's 'The Fire Next Time' and Isabel Wilkerson's 'Caste', as well as poems by Maya Angelou and Amanda Gorman. Feb 4, 2021 Film Discussion: 'Tale of Two Schools'

Two African American high school seniors have a lot in common but attend very different schools in Long Island. The film highlights educational inequities and how they affect the life trajectories of the students.



Feb 2, 2021 Panel Discussion: Are We Welcoming to All?

We teamed with the History Ministry to host a discussion on how we present Plymouth's story to visitors. Are our building and displays as welcoming and inclusive to all as we'd like them to be? We were joined by two experts: Lavada Nahon, Interpreter of African American History at NYS Office of Parks, and Dennis Montagna, Manager of History and Preservation at the National Park Service



Jan 21, 2021 Film Discussion: 'Jim Crow of the North'

The roots of racial disparities are seen in the methods - used by the real estate industry and government - that produced housing segregation in Minneapolis and other cities throughout the North.



Dec. 16, 2020 Care Mail: Holiday Greetings to Incarcerated Youth

Plymouth families wrote personal letters to teens in juvenile justice facilities to support them during the Christmas season. Organized through the nonprofit BreakFree Education.

We discussed this 5-part NY Times podcast. Focusing on one Brooklyn school, it illuminates issues of persistent inequity that arise in many integrating schools.




Aug - Sep, 2020 PS 307 Partnership - Gardens & School Supplies

> Plymouth members attended a reading of Sophocles' Antigone, presented by Theater of War. The performance fused Greek tragedy with stirring gospel music, followed by discussion of race, gender violence and social justice.

> We showed a short film about the successful prison ministry at Church of Gethsemane in Brooklyn and heard comments from Gethsemane Elder Nathanial Wright. We also sold Mothers' Day roses in Coffee Hour to benefit Gethsemane's programs.



Mar. 24, 2019 Panel Discussion: What's Wrong with our Parole System

> Plymouth hosted a discussion of New York's parole system, which reincarcerates blacks for technical parole violations at 12 times the rate of whites, and more than almost any state in the U.S. Our expert panel included Brooklyn DA Eric Gonzalez, Vincent Schiraldi of Columbia Justice Lab, Rob DeLeon of Fortune Society and Donna Hylton of Katal Center. Attendees signed letters to State legislators supporting proposed reforms.




Feb. 24, 2019 Film Discussion: Teach Us All




Oct., 2018 Three Conversations on Race / Faith Ed Classes


May 13, 2018 Mothers Day 'Bail Out' Event: Discussion & Rose Sale

Mar. 22, 2018 Book Discussion: The New Jim Crow

Michelle Alexander's book traces how the mass incarceration of the War on Drugs continues to leave millions of black men in a permanent state of social and economic exclusion. Led by Abigail Regier.



Mar. 18, 2018 Letter Writing: Bail Reform

Plymouth members wrote scores of letters urging the Governor to suppport bail reform proposals. They were delivered along with hundreds of others from Brooklyn's Interfaith Coalition on Justice Reform.



Mar. 15, 2018 Bail Reform Now!

A Community Forum on proposals to reform bail practices in New York State. We heard from legal experts, faith leaders, elected officials, and formerly incarcerated individuals about why NY laws much change in order to achieve justice in our criminal legal system. Plymouth co-sponsored, as part of an Interfaith Coalition on Justice Reform.



Feb. 27, 2018 Looking at the Whole: Field Theory, Oppression & You

A discussion, led by Carl Hodges, using field theory to gain a broader understanding of race and oppression.



Jan. 21, 2018 Talking with Children About Race: Workshop for Parents

What is racism? How does it differ from prejudice? How does it play out in institutional, interpersonal, and internalized forms? How can parents interrupt the transmission of racist ideas their children may receive? These are questions discussed by 36 Plymouth folks in a workshop organized by the Racial Justice Ministry and led by professional training group Border Crossers.




Nov. 20, 2017 Public Meeting with Brooklyn District Attorney Eric Gonzalez

A chance to hear how the recently elected DA will address policies that have a disparate impact on communities of color. Brooklyn faith groups and community groups met with the DA at Congregation Beth Elohim and asked him to reconsider some of his office's practices (bail requirements, prosecution of minor crimes, age limits for treatment as adults) to address important issues of racial justice.



Nov. 15, 2017 Book Discussion: Slavery by Another Name

Douglas Blackmon's book follows the life of Green Cottonham, a black youth born in the 1880's, and incidentally redefines the meaning of slavery and its sweep and duration into the 1930's. Discussion led by Carl Hodges.



Oct. 8, 2017 Plymouth at Work / Faith Ed Class: Racial Justice Ministry

If you're like us, you might have begun to hope over the past decade that American racism was fading into history. Sadly, news reports tell a different story: racism is still deeply ingrained in our society. Plymouth's RJ Ministry was formed to help members understand this issue more clearly and explore what we can do about it. Through a "gallery walk" of provocative quotes and images, followed by small group discussions, this session began to examine how we see race, how racism affects us and how these issues connect to our faith.
